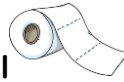

A very important skill



Learning to wipe their own bottom is an important skill for children to develop. Allowing them to do this for themselves once they are 3 or 4 is important in terms of developing their self esteem and independence. As with learning all new skills they will not be perfect straight away; they need to practice. We teach them to:

1. Take 2-3 squares of paper and hold them to cover finger ends.
2. Wipe bottom from front to back.
3. Check paper. If soiled, put in toilet and repeat action 1 and 2. Keep doing this until the paper remains clean.
4. Flush toilet, get dressed.
5. Wash hands with soap.
